Working for the Nebraska Department of Transportation and us working 4/10's gave me a chance to finish my 2024 Legacy Run Across Nebraska Road check. The route is good, and the only bridge work is in Ogallala and the Medal of Honor Hwy 20 has a bridge closed west of Bassett. Hopefully it will be done before

The route is Day One we will plan on leaving Lincoln on July 12th at 9:00 a.m. We will travel on Hwy 6 to our first fuel stop in Hastings at Pump & Pantry which has 91-octane. This year, June 6th, 2024, marked the 80th anniversary of D-Day. According to the Dwight D. Eisenhower Library,

The D-Day operation of June 6, 1944, brought together the land, air, and sea forces of the allied armies in what became known as the largest amphibious invasion in military history. The operation, given the codename OVERLORD, delivered five naval assault divisions to the beaches of Normandy, France. The beaches were given the code names UTAH, OMAHA, GOLD, JUNO, and SWORD.

The invasion force included 7,000 ships and landing craft manned by over 195,000 naval personnel from eight allied countries. Almost 133,000 troops from the United

States, the British Commonwealth, and their allies, landed on D-Day. The U.S. advanced on the UTAH and OMAHA beaches, the U.K. advanced on the GOLD and SWORD beaches while Canada took JUNO beach. Casualties from these countries during the landing numbered 10,300. By June 30, over 850,000 men, 148,000 vehicles, and 570,000 tons of supplies had landed on the Normandy shores.

Fighting by the brave soldiers, sailors, and airmen of the allied forces western front, and Russian forces on the eastern front, led to the defeat of German Nazi forces. On May 7, 1945, German General Alfred Jodl signed an unconditional surrender at Reims, France.

Every five years, a major celebration is conducted in Normandy, France to honor those veterans who stormed the beaches to defend democracy – a celebration attended by American Legion Family National Leadership. This year, according to organizers, was likely the last year the commemoration would be attended by living veterans of WWII. Of the 16.4 million Americans who served in WWII, roughly 100,000 are still with us (Department of Veterans Affairs, 2023). This somber fact reminds us that with each veteran who passes, his or her story passes with them.

In an effort to preserve these stories, the Library of Congress created the Veterans History Project nearly 25 years ago. The purpose is to "collect, preserve and make accessible the personal accounts of U.S. military veterans and Gold Star Families so that future generations may hear

directly from veterans and better understand their service." Anyone can participate in the Veterans History Project – all you need to get started is a computer to download the forms, a tape recorder or video recorder, and time to listen to a veteran. The website provides a complete field kit on how to conduct interviews and submit the information to the Library of Congress. Although our WWII veterans are dwindling, we have millions of veterans of other wars and conflicts who have so much left to tell. Let's spend some time with those veterans and record their stories so we can understand what it was like for them and gain a better perspective on all they sacrificed for the freedoms we enjoy still to this day. PACT Act Information

During a recent event I attended I was asked several questions about the PACT Act and what does it mean for veterans?

History

The act was first introduced on June 17, 2021, by Representative Mark Takano (D-CA), with the title of, The Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics Act of 2022, later known as the Honoring our PACT Act of 2022, and now most often referred to as the PACT Act. This Act provided for \$797 billion to significantly improve healthcare access and funding for veterans who were exposed to toxic substances during military service. Both the House and Senate passed the bill and President Biden on August 10, 2022. Hence the date (August 10, 2022) often referred to in publications with information on the PACT Act. Those who submitted a claim prior to August 10, 2023 (extended to August 14, 2023) will receive an effective date of August 10, 2022, which will result in them receiving retroactive benefits; this does not mean those who have not submitted a claim are barred from submitting claims or enrolling in VA health care. If you have not submitted a claim and believe you are eligible or want to find out more information about the PACT Act, I encourage you to reach out to your local CVSO. If you don't know your local CVSO, ask your Post Service Officer, he or she can provide you the contact information for your local CVSO.

What did the PACT Act do for veterans?

The PACT Act expanded access to VA health care and disability compensation benefits for veterans who were exposed to burn pits, herbicide exposure (Agent Orange), and other toxic substances.

Where are we now?

As of May 19, 2024, there have been 1,327,220 PACT Act claims completed with 995,749 claims approved in favor of the Veteran, which is a 75% approval rate on initial PACT Act claims submitted to VBA, this includes 19,064 survivors' claims. The average days for completion of a PACT Act claim is currently 166.3 days, with 37% of PACT Act claims being completed in under 125 days. 297,694 unique Veterans have enrolled in VA health care under provisions of the PACT Act.

Currently nearly 40% of claims being submitted to VBA are related to PACT Act, with VBA having an inventory nearly 395,000 pending claims. During April 71,000 PACT Act claims were submitted, and 90,000 Pact Act claims were adjudicated, demonstrating some gaining momentum with PACT Act claims. However, due to current inventory of claims, both PACT Act and Non-PACT Act related claims (555,000 Non-PACT Act claims), totaling over 900,000 pending claims, the current rate of gaining approximately 20,000 claims per month, will still mean that many veterans will be waiting nearly 6 months and some even longer to have their claims adjudicated.







COL Samuel Chapman Maxwell was born in Fremont and entered the U S Air Force from Omaha, Nebraska. Maxwell was a member of the 357th Tactical Fighter Squadron. On September 12, 1968 he piloted an F105D Thunderchief (Thud), tail number 59-1762, call sign "Wolf 3" on a reconnaissance mission over Quang Binh Province, North Vietnam. After arriving in the target area, Maxwell checked in with the Airborne Battlefield Command and Control Center (ABCCC) that was controlling all air operations. ABCCC provided Wolf flight with current weather and mission data before handing the flight over to the Forward Air Controller (FAC) who would direct the mission.

At 1731 hours, Wolf flight was directed to attack a line of small boats sailing on the Song Ron River 15 miles South of Mui Ron Ma. Wolf 3 initiated his strafing run on the boats and was seen firing at the target when his aircraft was hit by intense and accurate ground fire. Other flight members also saw the Thunderchief hit the ground and explode on impact. In the chaos of the battle and the impending darkness, the other pilots did not see if Sam Maxwell had been able to eject from his crippled aircraft.

His aircraft crashed into jungle foothills 2 miles east of the Song Ron River, 8 miles west of the coastline, 15 miles south of Mui Ron Ma and 31 miles northwest of the major port city of Dong Hoi; loss coordinates 175200N 1062300E (XE480772). A visual and electronic search and rescue (SAR) mission was immediately launched, but found no trace of the downed pilot. At the time the search effort was terminated, Sam Maxwell was declared Missing in Action (MIA).

The Defense Intelligence Agency further expanded Maxwell's classification to include enemy knowledge category 2; confirmed knowledge, lost in area under conditions that may reasonably expect to be known by the enemy, and were connected with an incident which was discussed, but not identified by names in enemy news media.

Military authorities were horrified in 1973 that hundreds thought to be POWs were not released. It is now clear, Maxwell was not among those thought to be alive.

On October 19, 1989, the Central Identification Laboratory – Hawaii, (CILHI – now DPAA), identified the remains of Colonel Samuel Chapman Maxwell, missing from the Vietnam War. Shortly thereafter, they were returned to his family for burial with full military honors.

In 1992, a National Security Agency (NSA) correlation study of all communist radio intercepts pertaining to missing Americans was presented to the Senate Select Committee on POW/MIA Affairs. This was finally declassified and made public. According to this document, three North Vietnamese radio messages were intercepted and correlated to this incident. The NSA synopsis stated an American F-105D aircraft crashed and exploded. No parachute or beeper signal was noted.

Colonel Maxwell is memorialized on the Courts of the Missing at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, His name is also inscribed along with all his fallen comrades on the Vietnam Memorial Wall in Washington, D.C.

Edgar J. Boschult Memorial Scholarship

The Nebraska American Legion has selected four recipients of the 2024 Edgar J. Boschult Memorial Scholarship. The Edgar J. Membership Minute Steve Bartos, Chairman

The 2024 Department Convention is now history, and we must move forward into the 2025 membership year. I don't suggest that we stop trying to renew the remaining 2023 members for 2024, but --- realistically --- retaining the 2024 members and building the 2025 count has to be our focus.

At the convention, Dave Bruckner (Area B) was re-appointed to serve a 4-year term on the membership committee. The Area A member's spot is vacant. Rich Baxter (Area D) and I are the other members.

While I think we actually had a fairly good year for 2024, so did most departments nationally. Some had very good years. And just about everybody made it past us at the end of the race. We finished in 30th place last year. But we're currently in 48th place out of 55 departments. And 7 departments have reached 100% of goal.

While there seems to be plenty of gloom, it doesn't have to be doom!!

Districts 5, 8 and 15 have exceeded 95% of their 2024 goals. And --- for the first time in many years --- we had a district achieve 100% of its membership goal. It can be done! I certainly congratulate Gary Sones and all the Legionnaires in District 1 for making that happen (102%). In recognition of that achievement, Gary was presented a bright red sport coat at the Department convention. Could it be that we started something? Could it be that maybe there will be more red sport coats in the future?

The 2025 membership year is going to bring some changes and some challenges. We have a dues increase taking affect, but we cannot allow that to be an excuse for failure. The migration of members to Post Everlasting never takes a break. We just need to do a better job of selling our product and convincing current members to renew and non-members to join.

Although much fewer than I expected, we've had about 400-500 members take advantage of the new 3-year renewal --- some for 24-25-26 and some for 25-26-27. That's going to front-end-load some early returns, but should pay off in the long run. The good deal for renewing for 3 years at the 2024 rate has now expired, but I encourage everyone to keep promoting the 3-year renewal option.

Our Headquarters Post 500 continues to puzzle me. On May 31st, they had renewed or enrolled 105% of their goal --- and their goal was basically calculated the same way as all of our posts (with a few extras tossed in). For some reason, the Post 500 Legionnaires are steady members but don't always respond real well to opportunities to transfer. Keep trying to get them into your local posts; that's really where we want them.

Once again this year, the Department Membership Committee is sponsoring an Early Bird Drawing. All regular members (those who pay their dues annually or are otherwise current as a result of taking advantage of the 3-year renewal option) whose dues are paid by September 3rd will be entered in a drawing. Five members will be selected to receive a \$200 prize each.

I look forward to visiting many



It was a thrill, honor, and privilege


to be your President. I was able to make it to events in Districts 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 8, 11, 12, and 13.

- 4. And always remember to thank your members regularly. There are different ways to accomplish this
- a. Create a video thank you message and post it on your website and/or social media.
- b. Publish a list of all the events, services, and educational opportunities that were made possible through your membership fees and volunteer service and post it on social media.
- c. Hold a yearly event to simply "have some fun" while also saying thank you to your members.
- d. Send handwritten thank you notes to your members. In our digital age, a personalized note is even more

memorable and meaningful.

e. Personally follow up with every prospect. You already know that person is interested in what you do – so be sure to reach out!

In closing, never forget how wonderful the conversations are that we have every day with people both near and far. And may we never overlook that every conversation might lead us to an opportunity to do or create something greater. If you've had one of these conversations with your friends and neighbors – or even a complete stranger, please share it with the rest of us, as we can all benefit by learning what ultimately will help our veterans. By working together, we will be "Always Remembering Their Service (ARTS)!"
